JOB TITLE	Out of School Club Role	JOB REF NO	AAAD5103
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1 BASIC JOB PURPOSE

To provide a high quality, inclusive play and care centred service that meets the needs of children, young people and their families. To be responsible for the day to day organisation and operation of the club in line with club policies and procedures, the National Standards for Out of School Care and statutory guidance on Safeguarding Children.

2 MAIN RESPONSIBILITIES

1	Provide a safe, stimulating environment for the children and young people.
2	Follow systems that ensure safe arrival and departure of children and young people.
3	Supervise children and young people and organise and prepare creative and appropriate play opportunities for the children.
4	Check that play materials and equipment are used and stored correctly and report any worn or damaged equipment to the Headteacher.
5	Follow school policies and procedures.
6	Refer concerns relating to child protection to the Headteacher / Designated Safeguarding Lead.
7	Liaise with parents and school staff where necessary.
8	Manage administration and record keeping such as keeping registers.
9	Be responsible for health and safety. Assure the safety of all children in the event of a fire, fire drill or other emergency. Administer first aid when necessary. (Training will be funded by school if applicant does not have first aid certificate).
10	Manage the provision of refreshments for the children.
11	Clean and tidy the play area at the end of each session.
12	Promote positive attitudes and contribute to the smooth running of the club.

This week our older children have awarded Clara in Reception this award. They told the children in assembly how she participated well in organised races and always listens so well to instructions. Well done, Clara.

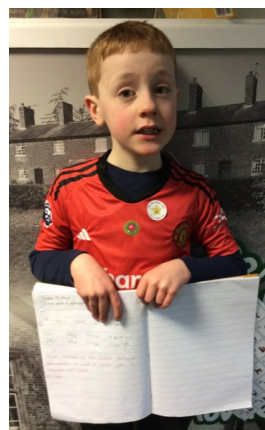
Mr Smith's PE Award

Many young people who are victims of cyberbullying suffer in silence.

They feel they can't turn to parents or a trusted adult for support as they fear they may get in trouble or have their devices taken away from them. It can carry on all day, all evening and all weekend for the world to see, causing a lot of emotional stress to the victim and their family.
